Johne's Disease

Johne's Disease is a chronic, debilitating and irreversible infection of cattle which is common in many herds. Whilst a few as 1-5% of cows in any year will show clinical signs of scour or wasting, more of the herd will be affected and suffer reduced output. Animals with Johne's Disease are likely to be culled earlier, and are also likely to be affected by other conditions, including chronic mastitis, lameness and high somatic cell counts.

Johne's disease is a fatal wasting disease of cattle, and is an increasing problem on farms across the UK. Industry focus and retailer pressure have raised the awareness of Johne's disease, and more and more is being done to attempt to reduce its impact on the dairy sector. One of the largest challenges in

combatting Johne's disease is the early detection of those animals which are infected in order to apply necessary control measures to limit further spread of the disease, both in the herd and between herds.

Fourth generation Cornish farmer, Stephen Bone has been farming at Trengwainton Farm with his wife, Alison, and parents for the last 17 years. They have a relationship with CIS spanning 15 years, using both milk recording and health testing services.

Five years ago, Stephen decided to start regular testing with the intention of identifying the level of Johne's in the herd with the long term aim of controlling and eradicating the disease. The result of using the CIS Johne's Monitoring Service has been better fertility and higher productivity in his dairy herd.
